As the curtain rose, the smoke from his 'seegar" was sucked into the packed auditorium and he ambled downstage to announce: "Ladies and gentlemen, I wish to present to you a man whose great learning and veneration for truth are only exceeded by his high moral character and majestic presence. I refer in these vague, general terms to myself."

I got to meet Mr. Holbrook again over the decades and always found him to be that same dear, generous man of enormous talent.

Ron Hubbard in Chick Corea's astonishing Alice in Wonderland-themed studios, and although he will be forever acknowledged for earning an incredible 23 Grammys and the most jazz Grammys ever, I here share some selections from a heartfelt tribute by our friend, actor, director and impressive impressionist, Jim Meskimen:

"In reading some of the innumerable tributes this weekend to my friend Chick Corea, I see that my own experiences with him were far from singular; like many who knew him, I was always a little surprised that he cared enough to maintain the friendship, that this legend, this artist for the ages, would benefit from spending any time with me.

"I consider Chick to be the ultimate performing artist. I will marvel forever at the creativity, deliberateness and delicacy of his playing, but also at the intention; he never did anything in his art without a purpose – one statement of which was 'to ease the effect of time on the audience.'

"Chick could travel to any far-flung place on earth and have a wonderful effect on an audience, whether they spoke English or not. That, I realize, is a tremendous skill, born of a deep and honest desire to better the lives of strangers.

Testing, testing


HE FOLLOWING QUESTIONS WERE SET IN last year's GED examination. These are genuine answers from 16-year-olds:

What is a terminal illness? When you are sick at the airport.



OMIC GENIUS ALLAN BURNS JUST GOT HIS last laugh at 86. He started as an NBC page, and then crafted Captain Crunch and greeting cards (like Firesign's **Peter Bergman**), until he was discovered by **Jay Ward** – who also worked with Firesign, by the way – and wrote for the cult classic "Rocky and Bullwinkle."

He went on to create shows like "He & She" with **Martin Mull**, on which I guest-starred, and then with writing

partner James L. Brooks, co-created, "The Mary Tyler Moore Show," and later "Lou Grant" (starring our *God Help Us* star Ed Asner) even though the network suits decreed that American audiences wouldn't tolerate "New Yorkers, Jews, people with mustaches and divorce."



The show went on to run for seven years winning 29 Emmy Awards and 22 Golden Globes. And, as **Michelle Obama** noted, "Mary wasn't married, she wasn't looking to get married. At no point did the series end with her finding a husband – which seemed to be the course you had to take as a woman."

His friend **Seth Freeman** added, "At Allan's core was a sense of social justice, which was reflected in everything he did. He was a mensch."



Carla appeared as a toddler in a 1939 newsreel learning how to walk the wire; but she said her first time was much earlier. "Actually, they carried me across the wire when I was 6 weeks old. My father rode the bicycle, and my mother sat on his shoulders, holding me and introducing me to the public."

City Lights shine on

AWRENCE FERLINGHETTI, WHO TURNED the page at 101, was, according to Fred Kaplan of Slate:

As responsible as any single other person for the rise of the Beats, the end of obscenity laws, and, not least, the transformation of San Francisco to a vibrant artistic center.

He did all this through the creation and flourishing of a bookstore, **City Lights** – which, seven decades after its founding, in 1953, remains one of the country's great literary bookstores – and a publishing house as well....

Throughout his life, Ferlinghetti was an activist in political as well as in literary causes and the roots of both may have been his time as a naval commander in World War II" where he saw "the horrific ruins of Nagasaki after the dropping of the second atom bomb....

Norman Mailer, in a famous 1957 essay on beatniks and hipsters, wrote, "Probably, we will never be able to determine the psychic havoc of the concentration camps and the atom bomb upon the unconscious mind of almost everyone alive in these years.... If the fate of 20th-century man is to live with death from adolescence to premature senescence," then the "only life-giving answer is ... to live with death as immediate danger ... to set out on that uncharted journey into the rebellious imperatives of the self."



a major fixture in network TV news for over three decades. He was a frequent substitute for **Walter Cronkite** on the "CBS Evening News," anchoring the weekend editions in

the late '60s - early '70s, considered as Cronkite's heir apparent.


Mudd, left, was also part of a Peabody Award-winning 1971 CBS documentary "**The Selling of the Pentagon**," which exposed the U.S. military's taxpayer-financed public relations effort to sell the Vietnam War.

"He was an inspiration to all of us in the bureau," said one of his colleagues, and was an irreplaceable and trusted part of our collective memory when "news was really news."

Call the Plummer

HRISTOPHER, THAT IS (RIGHT), who exited laughing at 91. A multiaward-winning Canadian character actor of extraordinary versatility and charm, featured in many prestigious stage plays in London and New York and over 200 movies and TV shows, he still thought himself "trapped" in the "saccharine" role of Capt. Von Trapp from **The Sound of Music** – although, as he admitted afterwards, "it became easier



for me to fill a theater."

Among his many honors, at 82, he acquired an Oscar for his role in **Beginners** (although he wasn't done

yet) and will long be remembered for his last screen appearance as the eccentric mystery writer in *Knives Out* and became the oldest actor ever to be nominated for an Oscar at 88, for stepping in at the last minute to replace Kevin Spacey as J. Paul Getty in *All the Money in the World*.

"I never want to retire," he revealed in 2015 to **Conan**. "I'm so sorry for people who actually want to retire; it means that they haven't loved what they do in life."
