Melinda and I had the distinct pleasure of working with Gavin McCloud in several onstage Old Time Radio recreations to raise money for "Desarts Performs" in Palm Springs, where he lived and died at the age of 90. In his wonderfully honest autobiography, This Is Your Captain Speaking, he describes his long journey to stardom as the wisecracking news writer on "The Mary Tyler Moore Show," and later as the Captain of "The Love Boat," of which he writes, "The critics hated it. They called it mindless TV. But we became goodwill ambassadors," culminating in his becoming the
