a school district in Utah has removed The Bible from elementary and middle schools for containing

"vulgarity and violence" based on a complaint

from a parent that the King James Bible has material unsuitable for children. Utah's Republican government passed a law in 2022 banning "pornographic or indecent" books from schools, but most of them pertain to topics such as sexual orientation and identity.

The banning of The Bible comes amid a larger effort by Conservatives to ban teachings on controversial topics such as LGBTQ rights and racial identity. Bans on certain books deemed offensive are also in place in Texas, Florida, Missouri and South Carolina, and even some liberal states have banned books in some schools and libraries, citing perceived racially offensive content. According to the *Salt Lake Tribune* newspaper, the parent who complained said the King James Bible "has 'no serious values for minors' because it's pornographic by our new definition," referring to the 2022 book-ban law.



Farewell my Fantastick Friend


Y "SHIRTTAIL COUSIN," GEORGE RIDDLE, passed away at 86, surrounded by his family at the home of his granddaughter in New Jersey.

George grew up in my hometown of Goshen, IN and began performing with his brother, **Bob**, in talent shows at the Lincoln movie theater, winning lifetime passes and later started his acting career at the Fred Miller Theater in Milwaukee, WI in 1956. [VIEW GEORGE IN ACTION]

George thrived on stage and appeared in many productions during his 65-year career, performing with **James Belushi** in the 1983 production of the **Gilbert & Sullivan** operetta *The Pirates of Penzance* and in the early 1990s in *The Will Rogers Follies*, where I saw him as Will's father, Clem, co-starring with actors **Keith Carradine, Mac Davis**, and **Larry Gatlin** in several national tours.

He also was in the popular 1981 hit *Arthur*, starring **Dudley Moore** and the 1988 television movie, "The Trial

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of Standing Bear," in which he co-starred as Civil War general **George Crook**.

But his most notable association was with the musical *The Fantasticks*, the longest-running show in off-Broadway history where George appeared over 5,000 times in various productions from 1963 through 2000, and in 2011, he became a recurring performer on the satirical TV show, "The Onion News Network."

He was a lifetime motorcycle enthusiast and among his prized


possessions were a rare Indian motorcycle and a 1941 Harley Davidson, which he built part by part in his fourth-floor walkup apartment in Greenwich Village.

He was the family historian and tirelessly worked on their genealogy, where he was able to trace a direct ancestor back to a signee of the Mayflower Compact.
